Our Mission



Build a nature-based adventure playground in Pioneer Park, in collaboration with the Shire of Augusta Margaret River, that will service the local region and invigorate Cowaramup businesses



Cater to children of all ages and differing abilities with inclusive, accessible play equipment and tall climbing structures for the risk takers



Collaborate with the community on the final design



Use natural materials: timber, boulders, water and native plants to encourage children to use their imagination and embrace the natural environment



Share traditional stories of Cowaramup, led by Wadandi Custodians, including the story of the Cowara bird

Why build a Nature-based Adventure Playground in Cowaramup?

Cowaramup is growing rapidly

- 30% population growth in 6 yrs and number of families doubled
- Another 300 residential lots recently released

No natural play spaces

- Cowaramup residents travel to access nature and adventure playgrounds (Vasse, Yallingup, Busselton etc)
- Only plastic and metal play equipment no nature play

Safety concerns

- Minimal leisure and play options on west side of Bussell Hwy to service Parkwater
- Current playground adjacent to un-fenced dog park

The Location

Pioneer Park, Cowaramup

There is an unutilised, shaded, mulched area at the back of Pioneer Park (behind the stage) which seems ready-made for a nature playground.

Project Cultural Goals

Led by Wadandi custodians from the Undalup Association, we aim to draw the larger community into the cultural and spiritual history of the area by telling the traditional story of the Cowara bird in artworks and installations.

We aim to achieve this by:

- Partnering with Wadandi custodians to create a culturally safe environment
- Giving a sense of belonging to local Aboriginal and non-Aboriginal children who will assist with design
- Encouraging imaginative play in nature and connection with country
- Creating collaborative relationships with other community organisations and local Aboriginal artists






Weaving Stories of Boodja

Fort Design

- Timber donated by local developer
- Not too polished less plastic, more natural materials
- Adventure for older kids some risk involved
- Climbing, building upper body strength
- Rope bridges
- Elevated and built around existing trees

Cowara Story Artwork / Pathway

- The Wadandi story of the Cowara stealing fire and being trapped inside the Balga tree (grass tree)
- Story visually represented on/around the circular, perimeter pathway
- Wheelchair and stroller accessible so everyone can enjoy the artwork and access the play equipment







Cowara Artwork/Pathway – cont.

- Timber artistry and carving along the path/ up fort
- Painted climbing poles
- Textile art



Scramble Pile

- Boulders donated
- Minimal maintenance
- Integrate with water play?
- Native grasses no mowing, minimal maintenance





Zip Line





- Facilities to engage older age groups
- Can be scaled down to fit space
- Very popular in destination playgrounds in SW
- At back of playground, away from foot traffic



Swings

- Options for all ages
- Wheelchair accessible or basket swing for inclusive play









Walkways

- Weave through existing trees
- Physical barrier between playground and the road





Toddler Cubby



- Hiding and imaginative play
- Entertainment for younger age group
- Connected to the sandpit with mud kitchen bench incorporated







Toddler Cubby – cont.

Incorporated into landscaping

 arbour to grow native
 creepers around



Sandpit

- Nature-based play for all ages
- Encircled with logs outdoor classroom, yarning circle and meeting space
- Next to toddler cubby / mud kitchen bench







Water Play


- Solar pump donated by local developer
- Natural materials
- Possible location for community artwork mosaic tiles in waterway, painting etc.











Benches

- Log benches
- Swinging benches
- Rest place for parents/grandparents/ carers
- Yarning circle/outdoor classroom

Next Steps

1	Design Confirm suppliers, begin first stage communications with community stakeholders and finalise design in community workshop
2	Fundraising Collaborate with Shire on Lottery West grant, apply for arts and disability grants and open public fundraising online portal. Engage with local businesses for donations and in-kind support
3	Artworks and Community Engagement Engage Wadandi custodians and local Aboriginal artists for artworks, launch marketing and publicity strategy
